HEADLINES

LAST TIME OUT

The Rapid City Rush said goodbye to 2025 with a dramatic 4-3 shootout victory over the Tahoe Knight Monsters on Wednesday. Both teams led in the game, but neither by more than one goal. The Rush scored three times in the second period, courtesy of **Rasmus Ekström**, **Bobby Russell**, and **Briley Wood**. Tahoe tied the game with two seconds remaining in the middle period with their second power play goal of the night. The 3-3 tie remained through a goalless third period and overtime. **Blake Bennett** and **Brett Davis** buried in the four-round shootout. **Connor Murphy** turned away three of the four shots he faced to seal the 4-3 victory.

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

The Rush have won three consecutive New Year's Eve games, defeating Iowa, Tulsa, and now Tahoe in their annual December 31st home showdown. Rapid City has hosted a NYE game five years in a row and owns a 4-1 record in those games.

MURPH IN THE SHOOTOUT

Connor Murphy picked up his first shootout win as a pro on New Year's Eve. You wouldn't know it by his performance: Murphy denied three of Tahoe's four shootout attempts, and made 31 saves on 34 shots against the offense which leads the league in goals scored.

STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

There is no doubt that the Rush have had a tough schedule through two-and-a-half months of the season. This is the 15th straight game the Rush are playing against a team currently ranked in the Mountain Division's top four. This will be the 10th time in the last 14 where the opponent is the top team at the time of the matchup. Amazingly, Rapid City has played just five games all season against teams currently outside the top four.

YEAR IN REVIEW

The Rush played 70 games in the calendar year 2025 and finished with a 36-30-4 record.

LAST TIME OUT VS. IDAHO**December 20, 2025 – Rapid City 1 @ Idaho 7**

The Rapid City Rush fell 7-1 to the Idaho Steelheads at Idaho Central Arena, the second such result in the series. Idaho raced out of the gates with three goals in the first eight minutes, then three more to start the second period. **Ryan Wagner** tallied the Rush's lone goal of the night, a power play strike midway through the third for his team-leading 12th of the year. **Quinn Olson** and **Blake Bennett** assisted on the play. Idaho outshot the Rush, 43-31, and led for over 58 minutes.

QUICK HITTERS**LOOKING FOR REVENGE**

The Rush return to Idaho just two weeks after dropping a series at Idaho Central Arena. Rapid City earned a 4-3 Friday win, but it was sandwiched between two 7-1 losses. It was the first time since December 2017 the Rush have allowed seven goals twice in the same series.

TOTALLY TUBULAR MOVES

Blake Bennett and Brett Davis each scored in the shootout against Tahoe goaltender Jordan Papirny. Bennett improved to 2-for-2 in shootouts this season, while Davis scored his first professional shootout goal.

LEADING THE WAY IN SHOTS

The Rush put up the first six shots on goal and led for the majority of Wednesday's game, which hasn't been common: Rapid City has outshot their opponent just nine times this season. They have four wins when doing so, and three of them have come against Tahoe. The Rush's nine wins when being outshot are tied for fourth-most in the ECHL.

A GAMER

Dave Smith signed defenseman Brady Keeper on Monday, bringing NHL and AHL experience onto the roster. Keeper had not played a professional game since January 7, 2024, but in his ECHL debut on Wednesday, the 29-year-old was on the ice for 24 minutes and looked as though he didn't skip a beat. Keeper is the 17th man in franchise history to play an NHL game, either before or after his tenure with the Rush.

ADDED TOUGHNESS

The snarl quotient on the Rush's roster increased significantly in the 11 days between games. Garrett Klotz, the leading enforcer in the ECHL, signed on and made his season debut on Wednesday. Darian Pilon returned after missing six games due to injury. Brady Keeper made his ECHL debut and mixed it up right away.

FIVE STRAIGHT FOR MURPH

Connor Murphy gets the nod in goal tonight and is set to earn a decision for the fifth straight game, something he has never done in his career. The Rush have not had a goaltender play a string of consecutive games this long since Christian Propp played nine in a row at the end of the 2023-24 season.

MAKING THE PPGs COUNT

The Rush have scored just eight power play goals this season, but those victories on special teams have resulted in wins: Rapid City is 5-1-1 when scoring a power play goal and 6-4-1 when not allowing a goal on their penalty kill.

FINDING A WAY

The Rush are tied for the fewest regulation wins in the division (8). Rapid City leads the Mountain with the most wins beyond regulation (5).

SHIFTING SCENERY

This is the first and only time this season the Rush are playing in two different cities in the same week, not a rarity in the ECHL but certainly one for Rapid City given the distance from divisional opponents. The team packed up their bags immediately after Wednesday's game and flew out to Idaho yesterday morning.

ONE HUNDRED IN RAPID

Second-year captain Ryan Wagner played his 100th game in a Rush sweater on Wednesday. His tenure with Rapid City has been nothing short of exciting and memorable, knocking down team records and earning an All-Star nod in his first season. He leads the team in scoring once again in year two.

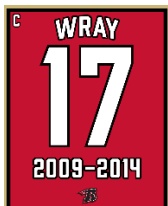

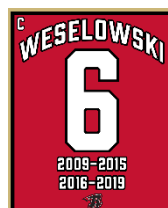

RETIRED NUMBERS**17 SCOTT WRAY Retired: Saturday, April 4, 2015**

Wray joined the Rush after spending two seasons with the rival Rocky Mountain Rage in the CHL. His first season in Rapid City was his best year of professional hockey with 31 goals, 47 assists and 78 points. That season, Wray would help lead Rapid City to their only hockey championship, winning the CHL Ray Miron Presidents Cup. Wray is the only Rush player to ever eclipse 100 goals with the franchise (106) and his 314 games played rank second in franchise history. In 2010-11 and from 2012-14, Wray served as captain. After his retirement in 2014, Wray was the head coach of the NOJHL's Powassan VooDoos, then served as an assistant with the OHL's North Bay Battalion. He is now the Head Coach in Owen Sound.

**30 DANNY BATTOCHIO Retired: Saturday, March 31, 2018**

After a strong OHL career and three years at St. Francis Xavier University, Battocchio joined the Rush and played every North American game of his career with the team. In 2010, he was named a CHL all-rookie team member and backstopped the Rush to a CHL title. With 131 career wins with Rapid City, no other goaltender has come close to the impact Battocchio made during his tenure with the Rush. In every professional season, he posted a better-than-.900 save percentage and posted a winning record all but one season between the pipes. Still living in the Black Hills, Battocchio has served as an emergency backup goaltender for the Rush, donning his iconic number 30 each time, and has stayed on board as their Goaltending Consultant.

**6 RILEY WESELOWSKI Retired: Saturday, October 29, 2022**

Touted out of Bemidji State, Weselowski began his career with the Idaho Steelheads before landing with the Rush in the 2009-10 season. A young bruiser on the 2010 championship team, he was awarded an "A" on his sweater in the 2011 season and became a fixture on the Rapid City blueline. He is the all-time leader in games played for the Rush with 571 appearances and has more penalty minutes than any other Rush player with 440. Weselowski would finish his playing career in Florida and then Wichita before hanging up his skates. After four years on the Kansas City Mavericks' staff, Weselowski was named Head Coach of the Cincinnati Cyclones in 2025, his first head coaching job.

HEAD COACH DAVE SMITH

ARTHUR, ONTARIO | NOVEMBER 21, 1968 | 1st SEASON AS HEAD COACH

On June 23, 2025, Dave Smith was named the Head Coach and General Manager of the Rapid City Rush. He is the fifth Head Coach in the organization's history.

Smith brings 27 years of coaching experience to Rapid City, all at the NCAA Division I level. Prior to joining the Rush, Smith led the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (R.P.I.) program for eight seasons (2017-2025). He served the prior 12 years as Canisius College's Head Coach (2005-2017), where he guided the Golden Griffins to three straight trips to Atlantic Hockey Championship Weekend, back-to-back title game appearances, and the program's first NCAA tournament in 2013. He was named Atlantic Hockey Coach of the Year in 2016-17.

Before his 20 consecutive seasons as a Head Coach, Smith spent the first seven years of his coaching career as an assistant in Division I for three different schools: Miami University (1998-2000), Bowling Green State University (2000-2002), and Mercyhurst College (2002-2005). In three seasons at Mercyhurst, the Lakers qualified for the NCAA tournament twice.

In the collegiate ranks, Smith has coached an extensive list of talent who advanced to play professionally, including in the National Hockey League. The list of NHLers includes Cory Conacher (Canisius), Kevin Bieksa (Bowling Green), Mike Glumac (Miami), and Pat Leahy (Miami). Smith also coached former Rush defenseman Carl Hudson at Canisius, and longtime Calgary Flames goaltending coach Jordan Sigalet at Bowling Green.

Smith turned to coaching immediately following a six-year professional playing career. A forward, Smith played a total of 448 games between the ECHL, AHL, and IHL. He amassed 140 goals, 324 points, and 1370 penalty minutes for his career, which included a 1993 Turner Cup championship with the Fort Wayne Komets (IHL) as a rookie. Smith was under contract with the New York Rangers in 1994-95. Before turning pro, Smith was a team captain and four-year letterwinner at Ohio State University, where he graduated in 1992.

A native of Arthur, Ontario, Smith and his wife, Susan, have two daughters, Ellis and Kylie.

Peter Drikos enters his third season on the Rush coaching staff in 2025-26. Hired as Assistant Coach in September 2023, Drikos earned a promotion to Associate Coach in July 2025.

Prior to his time in Rapid City, Drikos most recently served as the Cobourg Cougars (OJHL) head coach and general manager, capping off his eighth season of coaching Canadian juniors—five of them spent as head coach.

After playing for his hometown AAA U18 team, Drikos began a four-year OPJHL career that spanned from 2003-07. In 2006, he helped lead the St. Michael's Buzzers to their second consecutive OPJHL championship.

In 2008-09, Drikos dressed in Canada's CIS league for Ryerson University and then began his professional playing career.

Drikos' best season of hockey came in 2009-10 with the West Michigan Blizzard in the All-American Hockey League. That season, he logged five goals and 20 assists, tying him for third place on the team in the category.

During the 2010-11 season, Drikos joined the FHL's Akwesasne Warriors and won a Commissioner's Cup title.

During the 2011-12 season, Drikos played earned him a three-game loan to the SPHL's Mississippi RiverKings.

After a short hiatus from the game, the OJHL's Toronto Patriots tabbed Drikos to be an assistant coach. After two seasons as an assistant (one with Toronto and one with the Orangeville Flyers), he was hired as the head coach of the Brampton Bombers, a post he would hold for two seasons.

Drikos would also join the Milton Menace staff as an assistant for one season in 2019-20 before re-joining the Toronto Patriots staff as their head coach the following year. After two seasons in Toronto, Drikos accepted the general manager and head coach role in Cobourg.

Drikos is a native of Scarborough, Ontario.
