



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
## HOCKEY A-Z

- (Assist) A pass that precedes to a goal. A maximum of two assists can be awarded for each goal scored.
- **B** (Backhand) A pass or shot that is taken from the backside of a player's stick blade.
- **C** (Check) When a player uses their body to make contact with an opponent, often to separate that opponent from the puck.
- **D** (Dangling) When a player skillfully handles the puck through the opposition without losing possession.
- (Even strength) Teams have an equal number of players on the ice because no penalties are in place at that time.
- **F** (Face-off) The method used to begin play at the beginning of a period or after a stoppage in play.
- **G** (Goal) When the puck crosses the goal line and enters the net.
- (Hat trick) When a singular player scores three goals in a game.
- (Icing) A minor infraction that occurs when a player shoots the puck from behind the center red line to behind the goal line and is recovered by the opposing team first.
- **J** (Jersey) Uniform worn by hockey players to recognize which team they belong to.
- **K** (Kicking) The act of a player using their foot to move the puck. A goal that comes as a result of kicking the puck will not be counted as a good goal.
- Line) A combination of three forward players, a center, right wing, and left wing. Most teams designate a specific three-man line for different situations in-game.
- (Minor or major penalty) A two-minute or four minute penalty (minor) / A five-minute penalty (major

- **N** (Neutral Zone) Area of the ice between the blue lines.
- Offside) An infraction that occurs when a players' skates cross over the opponent's blue line before the puck does.
- P (Power play) Occurs when one team has more players on the ice than the other team as a result of penalties assessed to the opposing team.
- Quebec) A province in Canada where the NHL's Montreal Canadiens play. The Canadiens were one of the original six teams in the National Hockey League.
- **R** (Referee) The officials in charge of the game who are responsible for maintaining the flow of the game by calling penalties and starting and stopping play when necessary.
- **S** (Slot) The area on the hockey rink located directly in front of the goaltender between the face-off circles on each side.
- T (Tripping) A penalty which occurs when a player uses his stick or body part to cause an opposing player to fall or trip.
- (Undefeated) A team who plays a full season without losing any games.
- **V** (Vezina Trophy) The award given out to the best goalie in the NHL regular season.
- **W** (Winger) A forward position of a player whose primary zone of play on the ice is up and down along the boards on either the left or right side of the ice.
- X -(X-ray) A digital image taken of a player's bones when they may have been injured during game play or practice.
- Y (Yard sale) A comical term used to describe when a player's equipment (helmets, gloves, sticks etc.) are laying all over the ice as a result of a big hit or an in-game fight.
- **Z** (Zamboni) A truck-like machine used to clean the ice in between periods. It has a large heater

# THE ZAMBONI & ICE

Learn about what it takes to make the ice that goes into a hockey rink!



Water is fed from a wash-water tank 5 to the "conditioner" 6, which rinses the ice. Dirty water collected in front of a squeegee is vacuumed, filtered, and returned to the tank.

Clean water from the ice making tank ? is delivered to the ice through a pipe and spread evenly by a towel pulled across the ice behind the conditioner .



#### THE PROCESS:

Before a hockey season begins, the arena uses an advanced refrigeration system that pushes freezing salt water, also called "brinewater", through a system of pipes that run through a large piece of concrete known as the "ice slab". When the "ice slab" gets cold enough, a layer of water is put on top of it and the ice begins to grow. These layers will eventually become the ice rink that you see. When finished, the ice is comprised of about 12,000 to 15,000 gallons of water!


#### **KEEPING THE ICE NICE:**

In 1949, Frank J. Zamboni developed a machine that is used to clean snow off of an ice surface. This device, known as the 'Zamboni', produces a clean, smooth sheet of ice for hockey players and ice skates to perform on. The Zamboni works by scraping the ice surface and collecting the snow, which is later discarded. Then, it "cleans" the ice by putting down water which flushes the grooves deep in the ice, loosening any dirt or debris. The excess water and dirt is then collected. Finally, the Zamboni puts down a thin layer of heated water that freezes over, creating a smooth surface.



#### **ZAMBONI FACTS:**

- A. A Zamboni travels approximately 34 of a mile for resurfacing.
- B. On average, a Zamboni machine "travels" close to 2,000 miles each year while resurfacing.
- C. The blade on the Zamboni machine is designed especially for ice-resurfacing and vs sharp enough to slice through thick stacks of newsprint. The blade weighs 57 pounds and is ½ inch thick.
- **D.** When the machine resurfaces the ice, it is capable of removing close to 2,500 pounds of compacted snow, while it can leave about 1,500 gallons of water.



### THE PHYSICS OF HOCKEY

#### **FRICTION:**

Friction is a force that all objects have which makes them resist motion or movement against one another. Friction is what happens when two things push against each other; like two hands rubbing together or air slowing down a car.

There are two main types of friction: STATIC and KINETIC. Static friction is the friction that exists between a stationary object and the surface on which it's resting. Once the object starts moving, kinetic friction takes over.

#### **ENERGY:**





## ROYALS HISTORY


- The Royals play their ist game on October 12th. They record their first win in team history on October 20th.
- On October 11th Brian McCullough scores three goals in a game against the Wheeling Nailers to record the first hat trick in team history.
- The largest crowd in Royal's history (7,315) gather in Reading to watch a 4-2 win over the Trenton Titans.
- Future NHL Stanley Cup Champion goaltender Jonathon Quick plays 15 games with the Royals before going on to play for the LA Kings the following year.
- The Royals win the Kelly Cup Championship on May 25th. There was a big championship parade on Penn Street in the week following the big win.
- Kirk MacDonald is named Royal's head coach following the 2016-2017 season.
- The Royal's finish their season with a 6 game winning streak and Coach MacDonald signs a contract extension for the next season.
- The Reading Royals host their 20th Anniversary season. The home opener was on October 23rd versus the Norfolk Admirals with a final score of 6-4, giving the Royals their first home win of the year.
